

| 1897 | Amelia Earhart was born | |
| 1920 | With pilot Frank Hawk, she takes her first ride in an airplane. "By the time I had got two or three hundred feet off the ground, I knew I had to fly," she later recalled. | |
| 1930 | Amelia sets the women's world flying speed record of 181.18 miles per hour. | |
| 1932 | Amelia Earhart becomes the first woman to fly solo across the North American continent and back. | |
| 1935 | She became the first person to fly solo across the Pacific Ocean. | |
| 1937 | Amelia Earhart and Fred Noonan lose radio contact with the Coast Guard on a flight together. They disappear over the Pacific Ocean. | |
